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Abstract: The COVID-19 pandemic, described as the most disruptive health crisis since World War II, has left an unforeseen legacy of miseries for millions across the globe. Beyond its direct toll in lives lost, COVID-19's unexpected impacts have reshaped health, economic stability, mental well-being, and social cohesion. This article critically examines the breadth and depth of these miseries, blending recent data, visual evidence, and scholarly analysis to uncover the systemic shocks that the pandemic has inflicted across societies.

INTRODUCTION

In early 2020, the world was caught off guard by the emergence of SARS-CoV-2, quickly escalating into a global pandemic^{[1][2]}. Initially viewed as primarily a respiratory health crisis, COVID-19 soon exposed deep vulnerabilities—economic fragilities, social inequalities, and mental health deficiencies—that reverberate to this day. As of April 2025, the pandemic has caused over 7 million confirmed deaths and up to 33 million excess deaths globally, with ripple effects touching even those far from hospital wards^{[3][4]}.

GLOBAL OVERVIEW OF THE CRISIS

Health Impact

- **Deaths and Disease Burden:** By 2025, confirmed global deaths have reached over 7 million; excess deaths are estimated at 18–33 million^{[3][4]}. An unpredictable range of symptoms and persistent “Long COVID” add to the misery, particularly among high-risk groups and the elderly^{[5][2]}.
- **Healthcare Disruptions:** Essential services, including routine vaccinations and chronic disease care, were interrupted, leading to secondary surges in preventable diseases, maternal deaths, and untreated chronic conditions^{[4][2]}.

Economic Hardship

- **Recession and Job Losses:** The pandemic triggered the largest global recession in generations, leading to over 195 million equivalent full-time job losses at the peak, and deep contractions in world trade and service sectors^{[6][7][8]}.
- **Poverty and Inequality:** For the first time in decades, global extreme poverty increased, with the greatest burdens falling on low-income workers, women, youth, and informal sector employees^{[7][9][6]}.
- **Household Vulnerability:** Over 50% of households in emerging economies lacked savings to endure income losses, while many small businesses teetered on the edge of collapse^{[7][8]}.

Mental Health Crisis

- **Surge in Psychological Distress:** Increases in anxiety, depression, PTSD, and substance abuse were widespread. Pandemic-related distress reactions, such as sleep disorders and irritability, affected up to 38% of the population at various times^{[12][4]}.
- **At-Risk Groups:** Young adults, women, marginalized ethnic groups, healthcare workers, and those with pre-existing mental disorders bore the brunt of the psychological fallout^[12].
- **Service Disruption:** Mental health care access was severely limited, leading to exacerbation and under-treatment of mental health conditions^[12].
